<b>Funding Sources</b>	<p>Block Grant</p> <p>State Matching Funds</p>	<p>For the first three years, 90-percent Federal funding</p> <p>After the third year, 80-percent Federal funding</p> <p>Tribes who are unable to meet the non-Federal match may request a waiver</p>	<p>Set by law in FY 1994 at existing JOBS funding levels</p> <p>The Dept of Labor has allocated funds to tribes, Alaska Native entities, Indian organizations and consortia under WIA section 166.</p> <p>Some tribes provide additional funding</p>

Penalties	<p>Tribe penalized for failure to meet work requirement</p> <p>Misuse of funds</p>	<p>Failure to meet the requirements of the regulation and their approved Tribal plan can result in withdrawal of funding</p> <p>Misuse of funds (use of child support program dollars for non-child support activities) is subject to penalties and fines under the standard Federal audit process</p> <p>Failure to make necessary correction identified by a site-review</p>	<p>Section 166 (tribal) grantees are not sanctioned for failure to meet performance standards/goals.</p> <p>If warranted, tribes may receive in-depth technical assistance and training, either from Federal staff or from other grantees on a "peer-to-peer" basis.</p>
